There is no time of year that makes it a great option to live life unhoused, either under a tarp or in a tent along a creek or sidewalk, or in a vehicle on the side of the road. As morning temps begin to drop quickly into a more autumnal range, with winter just over the horizon, those choices become less and less palatable. I applaud Mayor Johnston's decision to declare a State of Emergency to marshal the city's resources to get 1,000 people off the streets and into housing by December 31. To give some context to that declaration of emergency, since I took office in 2015, over 600 people have lost their lives through traffic accidents. During that same time another 1,000 folks have died in Denver from gun violence. Topping the list, over the last eight years, approximately 1910 individuals have died on our streets from the direct or indirect effects of homelessness.

The Mayor has proposed a combination of three levels of managed facilities be employed to meet his housing goal of getting 1,000 people, currently living on the street into housing by December 31. First up, the city will move people into apartments the city has leased, as well as hotels/motels the city has purchased, providing immediate shelter for hundreds of unhoused residents. Next in line are micro-communities of tiny homes or pallet shelters to be established in all 11 Council districts, and finally, if needed, we will expand our inventory of Safe Outdoor Spaces using heavy duty tents on wooden platforms. All tiny home/pallet home/tent sites will provide bathroom facilities, community rooms and some will have kitchens. All will be staffed 24hours a day, seven days a week. All will present a variety of critical wrap-around services on site.

An abandoned parking lot at 1380 S Birch St. has been offered up as one of the potential temporary sites, immediately across the street from the affordable housing component of the revitalization of the old Colorado Department of Transportation headquarters property. I am cautiously supportive of the Mayor's plan. Preparing the site for use, and constructing the housing will be the easy part. More challenging will be finding the skilled staff needed to provide case management, mental health and addiction services, and security on site. With those in place, I believe the Mayor's plan can be a success, without them, the chance for success drops precipitously.

What we do know for sure is what the city has done in the past has not lessened the number of people on our streets. As I mentioned early in this piece, this is a life and death matter. Left unhoused and unhealed, many of those living unsheltered will continue to spiral downward. Given secure housing and the needed support, a large number can return to an independent productive lifestyle. Those needing long-term care can be directed toward options for safe haven.

I believe we all want a safe Denver where everyone is housed and our neighborhoods feel safe. The discussion, and the process, will be challenging, but we must find a better way forward. Paul

Proposition HH, Property Tax Changes and Revenue Change Measure

Would reduce the property tax rate and allow the state to retain and spend revenues that it would otherwise be required to refund to residents under the <u>Colorado Taxpayer's Bill of Rights (TABOR)</u>, to give local governments to make up lost tax revenues from the property tax rate reduction.

Proposition II, Tobacco and Nicotine Product Tax Revenue Measure

Asks voters to either (1) allow the state to retain and spend revenue the state received above the estimated revenue generated from increased taxes on cigarettes and tobacco and nicotine products and dedicate the retained revenue to fund preschool programs or (2) refund \$23.65 million to distributors and wholesalers and reduce the tobacco tax rate by 11.53%.


Of the three DPS Board of Education seats up for election, two will be on the ballot for Cory Merrill residents: Director District 1 and the At Large seat. Current holders of these seats are **Scott Baldermann** (District 1, elected in 2019) and Auon'tai Anderson (At-large member, current board vice president, elected in 2019). Baldermann, a DPS parent who runs a small software company, has one challenger: parent and former charter school network CEO **Kimberlee Sia**. The at-large race is crowded with four candidates: parent and security consultant **Paul Ballenger**, parent and doctoral student **Brittni**

Johnson, DPS graduate and bookstore owner **Kwame Spearman**, and parent and former East High principal **John Youngquist**.


COLORADO GIVES DAY


