Hey, D-6ers -

The world as Paul would like to see it as we look ahead in 2024.

- Humans have figured out how to solve problems without making each other's lives untenably difficult, or trying to end them altogether.
- Humans have realized that natural resources have limits, cherish them and consume them with prudence.
- Homelessness and criminal behavior have been recognized as the inevitable result of societal failures and inequities. Policies to fund critical supportive programs have been enacted to prevent their occurrence.
- A combination of enhanced public health programming and better trained and staffed safety agencies have made Denver a city where all residents feel safe in their homes and communities.
- Colorado is now a leader in per pupil funding for education (we're now near the bottom of the list of states).
- Innovative programs to assist youth in mental health distress have dramatically reversed the disturbing increases in suicide among young people.
- Mental health and addiction treatment services are readily available and covered by all insurance providers.
- Affordable/attainable housing is now available to all Denver residents with an emphasis on increasing home ownership opportunities for lower income levels.
- Healthy food is readily available in all Denver ZIP codes, making food insecurity a thing of the past.
- The numbers of serious injuries and deaths on our roadways are declining as Denver has aggressively implemented traffic calming measures across the city.
- Bicyclists now have a far more expansive connected network of protected pathways to safely take them to home, work or play.
- The Department of Transportation and Infrastructure has begun the construction of a fully connected, properly maintained sidewalk network through an equitable fee structure that does not unfairly burden individual taxpayers.



Denver Loves Electric Bikes (E-bikes)!

Denver's growing rebate program for e-bikes put 2,831 e-bikes on the roads in 2023. Better yet, 1,068 of those bikes went to incomequalified individuals. Over 200 e-bikes were distributed through community partners. They also gave out 19 adaptive e-bike rebates!

Check out a free E-Bikes 101 class, and stay tuned for more information about when and how to participate in 2024. You can also check out the state's e-bike rebate program, set to launch for all CO residents this spring.



Beginning September 1, RTD is excited to welcome a future generation of transit users to experience all the benefits without a fare.*

Zero Fare for Youth is a one-year pilot program that aims to enhance the lives of RTD customers and communities by reducing transportation costs for families. By inviting ages 19 and under to ride at no cost, we also remove barriers to education and employment, while creating access to destinations across the metro Denver region.






WANT TO BE A SNOW ANGEL?

WINTER & A WARMING PLANET

2023 was Earth's hottest year. 2024 is predicted to be hotter.

It is strange to worry about rising global temperatures when it is still cold and (sometimes) snowy outside our Denver windows. Yet the start of 2024, predicted to be hotter than record-setting 2023, is also a good time to review the efforts our city is making, and find ways to act and advocate ourselves. **The Climate Protection Fund, voted in by Denver voters in 2020, raises \$40M annually to act urgently to mitigate the causes of climate change and to center that work on equity.** The goal is that over half of this fund goes to communities in Denver most harmed by climate change impacts. See Denver's list of accomplishments (highlights below) online - and find areas where YOU can get involved in 2024.

- **Progress Towards More Clean Energy for More Denverites,** including a bigger solar co-op: 1,947 households and small businesses signed up for rooftop solar through <u>Solar Switch Denver</u>. Nearly 300 of them moved forward to install new solar arrays. Want to participate in a future SolarSwitch cohort? You can <u>register today</u> so that you're already on the list when those cohorts open up.
- Fruitful Tree-Planting Seasons! Denver had the goal to <u>plant 2,100 new trees</u> in heat-vulnerable neighborhoods by 2025. The program won a \$5 million grant from the Inflation Reduction Act, which will <u>triple the size of this program</u> in future years. Since starting, we have planted 1,014 new trees!
- **Denverites Electrifying Their Homes and Buildings** Denver's <u>home energy rebates</u> helped 430 households make the switch to an efficient electric heat pump! Many of these homes lacked air conditioning before installing their heat pumps. Income-qualified homes, commercial and multi-family buildings also made progress under specific city programs.
- Funding Denver Businesses to Go Green Nearly 120 businesses are now certified through <u>Certifiably Green Denver</u>. This program provides free consultation on improving operations to be more sustainable. The CGD program also gave out \$324,977 in <u>equity grants</u>. These funds helped 41 women- and minority-owned businesses reach their sustainability goals. Projects ranged from new energy-efficient equipment to incentivizing sustainable transportation for employees.
