Finally, the first day of spring is in reach. With it, and the days that follow, comes the annual burst of new life in our gardens, the blessed shade and fresh color of our urban tree canopy, and the joy of being able to sit outside with friends with both reasonable temps and light lasting ever longer into the evening.

NEW PRIORITY YOUTH PUBLIC COMMENT FIRST MONDAYS: City Council will be adding a check box on its sign up page to indicate "18 or younger" in age. Those speakers will be prioritized to speak first on the First Monday of each month. In the 30 minute session we can usually hear about 10 residents. YOUTH 18YRS & UNDER: Think about a concern in your community that you feel passionate about or that affects you directly, and that is within the responsibilities and jurisdiction of City Council. What would you like to tell City Council about how this impacts you and what solutions you might have to address the issue? What do you want City Council to know about what it is like to be you growing up in Denver? What ideas do you have that can make our city better for you, your peers, your family? After signing up, you can attend and present comments in person in City Council Chambers, 1437 Bannock, 4th floor, or join the meeting via Zoom.

SUPPORT NEW IMMIGRANTS IN DENVER: Denver is home to thousands of migrants, fleeing distressing situations, and we need to do what we can to help get them on their feet and give them opportunity to build a better life. Regardless of your opinions on politics or immigration, there are children sleeping in tents in extreme temperatures all across our city. These local organizations and opportunities need your support:

- The LOVVE Project (supports families at Ellis and now McMeen Elementary Schools) and The Giving Grocery (supports South High School families)
- Newcomer's Fund (all donations go directly to the city's nonprofit partners who are supporting migrants with resource navigation, work authorization, shelter and other services)

Meet CMNA Neighbor Bill Lutomski!

Bill Lutomski is the artist behind many of Denver's - and our neighborhood's most original stained glass windows. Over his 40-and-counting-year career, Bill has done work at the Phipps Mansion, the St. John Paul II Center, South High School and more. Today, he's restoring a large stained glass window at Burns Memorial Church, next to Aurora Central High School. The window is "on the verge of total fatigue" and not structurally strong enough to be removed from the building, so the decision was made to have a skilled craftsman (Bill!) restore it on site. Once a seminary, Burns is now home to a church and congregation that includes the largest Tonga Christian community in CO. To honor this, Bill is working with church leadership to represent Tongan Christian culture in imagery within the restored glass. Learn more at <u>leadedglassrepairdenver.com</u>

CMNA Neighborhood Meeting Recap

HIGHLIGHTS FROM FEBRUARY 7

Update from District 6 City Councilperson Paul Kashmann

Paul announced this will be his final term for District 6. He has been working for over 45 years in some capacity. He introduced his new senior aide, Masha Lior, who is responsible for the area west of Colorado Blvd. Paul also gave an updates on Mayor Johnston's Homelessness Initiative and the city's migrant and newcomers response.

Amy Ford has been named the new **Executive Director of the Department of Transportation**. She will be focusing on how to control traffic and reduce traffic related deaths. She has been made aware of the traffic issues of Mississippi and Florida.

Mayor's Office - Operations Coordinator Sterling Simms and **Deputy Director of Outreach Tran Nguyen-Wills** gave updates about the city's House 1000 initiative* and Newcomer and Migrant Support efforts. Learn more at denvergov.org/Newcomers.

ADUs in Denver

After the meeting, Councilperson Kashmann's office provided requested additional information about ADUs: ADUs are allowed in Denver, and property owners can build them as long as their property is zoned for them. If a property is not zoned for an ADU, then the owner will have to go through a rezoning process to allow for ADUs. Most properties in Denver are not zoned for them, so it is likely that Cory-Merrill residents wanting to add an ADU would need to go through the permitting process. Here is a project guide for detached dwelling units that residents might find helpful. Here is some additional information from the Community Planning and Development website:

Zoning establishes standards for things such as the size and location of structures and acceptable uses for your property. Before you begin construction, you need to be sure your project is in compliance with the <u>Denver Zoning Code</u>. Use the DevelopDENVER tool to determine the zoning for your property. In the results, click on your zone district for descriptions and <u>definitions</u>; then, click on your neighborhood context for more information on zoning in your area.





The Colorado SNAP Bonus Program will reimburse SNAP recipients for buying eligible fruits and vegetables at select locations throughout the state, including several farmers markets beginning in May. SNAP participants do not need to apply or sign up for this program, but instead will automatically receive a 100% reimbursement for any qualifying purchases at included retailers (up to \$20 per day, with a maximum reimbursement of \$60 per month).











CALL FOR SUPPORT: DENVER SOUTH GIVING GROCERY

South High School's Food Pantry Program Faces Funding Flux At A Time When Need Is Soaring

Founded 10 years ago to provide non-perishable food to help sustain families of South Hight School's new immigrant students - known as Newcomers - over the weekend, the Giving Grocery has expanded to now serve over 200 South students weekly. Student's needs are greater than ever, due to expired COVID-era SNAP benefits, soaring food prices, and an influx of Newcomers who arrive from all over the world, including most recently Venezuela, Afghanistan, Mauritania, and Congo. The program offers local, healthy, and culturally significant foods and encourages students to take home enough fresh produce, milk, eggs, meat, bread, and pantry staples - as well as personal care items like laundry detergent, shampoo, toilet paper, and more - for their whole family, completely free of charge. The Grocery is set up like a grocery store to offer students choice, ensuring that they can select items that align with their cultures and preferences. All perishable food remaining at the end of the day is shared with school staff and other food pantries nearby, as the Giving Grocery is committed to generating nearly zero food waste. The Giving Grocery is made possible by the hard work of its volunteers, who put in over 80 hours weekly, as well as by the generosity of individual donors, community partnerships, and grant funding. All money raised goes directly to purchasing food and personal care, as the Giving Grocery has no paid

staff or overhead.

Unfortunately, the largest source of funding for the Giving Grocery is a grant from the City of Denver that expires this school year. Due to budget cuts across municipal programs, the city is not able to renew the grant for 2024-25. This leaves the Giving Grocery in the difficult position of raising an additional \$120,000 in order to continue meeting the needs of food-insecure South High School students.
