Cory-Merrill's Spring Neighborhood Yard Sale is May 15, 16

he Cory-Merrill Neighborhood Yard Sale is back! Get ready for spring cleaning season, when we have an opportunity to reduce clutter, make a few bucks, and meet some of our neighbors.

Last year, we canceled our annual neighborhood yard sale due to COVID-19. With more familiarity with health risks this year, versus last, and a bit of vaccine-induced optimism, we are putting the event back on the calendar for mid-May.

You can participate in two ways: as a seller and/or a shopper. We invite all homeowners to host their own yard sales on Saturday and Sunday, May 15th and 16th to benefit from our promotion and increased shoppers in the area. There will be yard signs along the neighborhood perimeter on University, Mississippi, and Colorado Blvd to attract shoppers into the neighborhood sales. To help shoppers navigate the neighborhood sales, dozens of smaller signs will be placed at the end of blocks that have a sale and maps will be available online and in print at Arizona & Steele.

By registering your sale, I am able to share more detailed information with you and incorporate your sale locations into our marketing efforts to attract more shoppers. For a few weeks before the yard sale event, you will see signs around the neighborhood that encourage people to register their yard sales.

We hold the sale over two days in part to allow for a bout of bad weather that can grace us in May. Due to the preparation effort, the event is rain or shine and sellers use their judgment as to when their yard sales are active. Sales typically are active from 8am to 3pm each day.

There will NOT be a centralized location to drop off items; all sales are at houses, either in the front yard or alley garage. There will NOT be a donation collection truck or rollout trash dumpster available. Individuals are encouraged to schedule



or drop off their own donations with charities. Denver has a large item pick-up trash day that may be helpful. We will continue to monitor the COVID health and safety outlook leading up to the event. Additional event information will be available online and sent via email to participants.

The Tiffin Inn at Writer's Manor

ost Cory-Merrill residents would not be aware that an iconic restaurant was situated just across the street from the neighborhood's boundary.

The Tiffin Inn was considered one of Denver's "fine" restaurants for nearly five decades. It was first located at 16th and Ogden, just east of downtown, at the end of World War II. It moved during the '60s to a new location in the Writer's Manor "Motor" Hotel, located at South Colorado Boulevard and I-25, which locals called the Valley Highway.

At the end of its reign the Tiffin Inn was renamed Churchill's – retaining its prestige in the pantheon of Denver's best places to go. Writer's Manor began with 105 rooms and ended in 1991 with 325 rooms, suites

and conference and banquet rooms – along with a terrific coffee house.

It was torn down to make way for a new shopping center that



was anchored by Toys-RUs – now Best Buy. Above is the recipe for Beef Stroganoff was given out to patrons to see if they could match the culinary skills of the chefs of The Tiffin Inn.


Upcoming Food Truck Nights

Preserving Our Democracy

hat phrase has been on the lips and on the minds of many Americans in recent weeks, since a violent mob stormed the U.S. Capitol, leading to destruction, injury and death. Depending on where you reside on the political spectrum, views will differ on what is threatening the preservation of our American way of life and who is responsible for that threat. We are hearing more loudly than ever from communities – again on all sides of the "aisle" - that have long felt unheard, and deprived of the constitutional guarantees of "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

As a writer, I can develop a script where our country becomes so vehemently divided that we descend into a place of civil war. That said, I can also create a script that reveals this to be a watershed



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moment where the threat of that level of division with our neighbors prompts us toward a more open and inclusive dialogue that allows all sides to be heard, and their concerns to be considered and rational compromise to be achieved. While I admit some pessimism that the latter scenario might unfold, I cling to the hope that it is possible, and am committed to working toward that end.

Locally, Denver's governing structure needs to increase efforts to mine the full breadth of opinions and ideas coming from our diverse citizenry. The Registered Neighborhood Organizations (RNOs) that serve our neighborhoods need training and resources to enable them to better fulfill the need for them to inform residents of what is going on in city government that effects them, and to then let city government know what the neighbors think about that.

There are many people who, for whatever reason, do not presently participate in the RNO structure. We need to not only help the RNOs better serve that population, but we must open up other avenues of information exchange and participation to the community of people who simply are not joiners but still want to have a voice.

Denver can and must do better at mining the ideas and concerns of its citizenry.

Have a great month. Wear a mask. Keep your distance. Wash your hands.
