## **CMNA Bids Adieu to Vacation Rentals**

This fall, Cory Merrill Neighborhood Association (CMNA) helped shut down a vacation rental property on South Garfield

after adverse reactions from nearby neighbors.

"I've lived here for four years, and every few days there was someone different living in there," said neighbor George Mayl. "They'd have loud parties, throw trash in the yard, and the parking situation was a mess because you'd have all these cars taking up places in then a new group of people would move in." The house was rented out on a daily/ weekly rental agreement, which violates

front of our house. We didn't feel safe, and we couldn't do anything about it because the partiers would leave after a few days, and dation to Denver's Board of Adjustment, which made the final decision to shut down the vacation rental property.

"The bottom line is vacation rentals violate the zoning code," said CMNA zoning chairman Don Tressler. "It was clear that the neighbors were overwhelmingly against it. They took action, and we responded. Plus there was no way we could have allowed this because it would have set a precedent for all neighborhoods in Denver."

During the hearing, CMNA learned the owners had set up a business, renting their other Denver houses as vacation rental properties, even advertising them on a Vacation-Rentals By Owner website. Other affected neighborhood associations, Councilman Charlie Brown, and Denver's Inter-Neighborhood Cooperation also sided against vacation rentals.

"Life is a lot better now that the constant stream of people are gone," said Mayl. "I don't mind renters if they're longterm renters. This was ridiculous. We moved into this neighborhood because it's a great place to live...not so I could live next door to a motel."

"The process works," said CMNA Board President Dan Chapman. "I'm glad we could help."

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## Cory Merrill – State of our Neighborhood Report 2010

The face of Cory Merrill changed only ever so slightly in 2010. In a survey conducted in Fall 2010, CMNA counted 524 homes within our boundaries that were either existing two-story homes or new construction (pop-top or scrape-off). This was an increase of six new homes, down from 22 new homes in 2009.

Though the total number of new construction has slowed, our neighborhood has several homes undergoing extensive remodeling. These homes are expanding into the back of the yard rather than popping a top.

"Cory Merrill continues to be a desirable neighborhood where people want to live," said Coupar Lester, a MegaStar Financial mortgage broker. "I've recently seen an uptick in the number of young professional families who consider it to be a top location to invest their real estate dollars."

The highest concentration of two-story/ new construction homes remains west of Steele (35%). East of Steele, the number is 15-percent. Of Cory Merrill's 97 blocks, 84 of them (87%) have at least one home that is an existing two-story or new construction.

On the real estate front, our neighborhood saw more homes sold in 2010 than in 2009; and homes spent fewer days on market. Additionally, the price-per-square foot in 2010 remained stable from 2009 at \$277/ square foot.

Real estate broker Don Tressler of Tressler and Associates thinks the neighborhood has weathered the downturn because of its location and amenities.

"Cory Merrill has a lot going for it: solid schools, great transportation, and it's close to lots of shopping," said Tressler. "That attracts a lot of people, whether they are looking for homes priced at \$179,000 or over a million."




In 2010, more homes sold in Cory Merrill with fewer days on the market.

## **Turn of the Century Map**

in 1905, this mucky, frog-filled gulch was scheduled to be a housing development called "First Addition to University Park."

The map also shows the railway line that cut diagonally along the south end of our neighborhood. It was the Denver-Southern rail line, (now Buchtel Boulevard). At the time, the narrow-gauge railway was a critical connection between Denver and towns as far south as Fort Worth, Texas. The map shows the railroad owned most

Cory Merrill neighborhood in 1905. The top of the map is east. The diagonal line on the right is the old railroad that was on our southern border.

If you have any historical facts or stories concerning Cory Merrill and surrounding areas around it, please contact Scott Takeda at 303-759-0707 or email him at communications@ corymerrill.org In 1905, Denver hired Philadelphia mapmaker George William Baist of Baist Real Estate Atlas to create a detailed map of Denver. He was chosen because he had created maps for several other cities including Los Angeles, Washington D.C., and Seattle.

Denver's map consisted of 34 plates. Plate #30 shows the area that became Cory Merrill. It is a record of actual roads and farmhouses in 1905 as well as the subdivisions that developers were planning on building. For example, instead of showing the dry creek affectionately nicknamed "the Swamp" (now I-25), the map shows streets and lots. Back of what is now Washington Park neighborhood. It also shows a large brickyard at the southwest corner of our neighborhood, situated roughly at the modern-day intersection of I-25 and University and extending north to the Denver District 3 police station. The yard provided brick to much of the area's construction.

Interestingly, the map was published before the century-old seminary campus was built at our center. At the time, the area was called Coronado Heights Addition before the Catholic Church purchased it.


To report problems, Cory Merrill residents should call 3-1-1.

In the rare instances where a property owner refuses to comply, Denver takes escalating legal action, which can include issuing an Administrative Citation that carries a \$150 penalty.

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## **Recycling News**

### Cory Merrill Ranked #7

A recent review of Denver's recycling program shows that Cory Merrill neighborhood ranks seventh in citywide participation. We are tied with Platte Park, Wash Park West and Montclair with 76-percent of households recycling household plastics, metal, and paper. Stapleton neighborhood is ranked #1 in Denver with 87-percent participation. Elyria Swansea is ranked last with 17-percent. Denver Recycles is a free recycling service for all homes in Cory Merrill. ### Denver Recycles now takes #5 Plastic

Denver Recycles has partnered with Yoplait to expand its plastic recycling program to accept #5 plastic cups and tubs. The curbside program already accepts #1 and #2 plastic. #5 plastic is polypropylene, usually found in yogurt containers, syrup bottles, caps, straws, and medicine bottles. It is recycled into signal lights, battery cables, toothbrushes, and even landscape borders.

### **Denver Snow Removal Plan**

Main streets (or most streets with stripes) are the priority for Public Works and will be cleared with the largest plows because they carry most of the city's traffic as well as emergency vehicles.

During major snow events of at least 12 inches of snow with prolonged freezing temperatures, 4x4 plows may also be deployed to simultaneously clear residential streets.

Depending on conditions, Public Works may also use anti-icer and deicer to improve the condition of the roads. Liquid magnesium chloride is an anti-icer that will prevent the snow from bonding to the pavement.

After snow has accumulated on the pavement, Public Works will apply a de-icing agent to the streets to prevent the snow from building up and turning into ice.



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
