### Wash Park Loop gets Makeover

ashington
Park's drivers,

bikers, walkers, runners, roller-bladers and dogs will soon see some changes to their routes when Denver Parks and Recreation begins improvements to the Loop Road and removes some parking inside the park. The changes were necessary because of accidents and near misses between "vehicular. pedestrian and wheel-based recreation activities," says Adrienne Burton, the West Denver Parks Planner in charge of the project. The loop's current two lanes—one each for bicyclists and pedestrians—will be reconfigured as three. The innermost, twoway lane will be for pedestrians, while the middle one-way lane will be for bicyclists and fast roller-bladers. Runners and slower folks on wheels will get the outside lane. The reconfiguration will not affect the outer or inner footpaths but will add improved crosswalks and warning signs for

The new configuration should create a better separation between each of the groups, with buffer zones and "a simple and logical system" of pavement markings and signage. But before those changes get underway, your favorite parking space may disappear—if it's one of the 32 spaces along the west side of the Loop by the boat house or east of the park's maintenance structure. However, Burton points out that there will still be 263 parking spaces inside the park. Burton says changes have been three years in the making, with multiple public meetings and surveys along the way.

One of those was David Matthews, long-time Board member of FANs and West Washington Park Neighborhood Association, who's been involved in the planning. His objections to the plan stem from the issue of "safety among competing needs." He personally witnessed a serious accident recently when a bicyclist entering the park from Marion Parkway hit a car coming out. Work on the Loop Road and parking is scheduled to begin later this spring.

### **Traffic Signs Obscured**

#### Message from City Councilman Paul Kashmann, District 6

hat a marvelous experience is springtime in Denver, never knowing from one day to the next which season will actually show up. Snow one day, blue skies and bright sunshine the next.

As always, there is much ado at City Hall. The Mayor has established five committees with broad-based community participation that have begun evaluating some 3,000 projects vying for a place in the General Obligation Bond package that will go before voters in November. Expected to total in the \$500-\$600-million range, voters will be asked to approve capital construction in the areas of Parks & Recreation, Arts & Culture, City Facilities, Public Safety and Transportation & Mobility. If the bond request is kept in the \$500-\$600-million range, there will be no need for taxes to be raised, as the city's bonding capacity can

be met with our current level of revenue.

The last such GO Bond issue the Better Denver Bonds – took place in 2007. Over 375 projects were funded through the \$535million package. Rather than being asked to approve a lump sum amount with no detail as to how the money will be spent, voters should expect to be presented with a menu of specific projects grouped into their appropriate categories, presenting the option to approve one category and not another. When Colorado voters approved Amendment 64 to legalize the sale of marijuana for recreational use, the hours allowed during which sales could take place were set at 8 a.m.-midnight, with the provision that cities could decide their own hours within those boundaries. Denver allows sales from 8 a.m.-7 p.m. Among our close-in neighbors, Wheat Ridge is the only other municipality with a 7 p.m. limit. Englewood and

Northglenn dispensaries close at 8 p.m.; Thornton chose 9 p.m.; Aurora, Boulder, Commerce City, Lafayette and Louisville dispensaries shut down 10 p.m.; and Edgewater and Glendale stay open until midnight. At a recent meeting of Council's Marijuana Committee, a bill was moved forward that, if approved, will approve extending Denver's hours until 10p.m. While a consistent voice in opposition of midnight, I voted in favor of extending hours for Denver's 220 dispensaries until 10 p.m. for the convenience of consumers. I pushed back against a later closing time to limit the slamming of car doors and late night conversations outside marijuana businesses adjacent to our residential areas. My recent survey of my District 6 mailing list showed a 50-50 split between those wanting extended hours to those who did not. I continue to be optimistic that, in the near future, we

will change the way our city addresses its pedestrian infrastructure. While maintenance of city streets is covered by your tax contributions, maintenance of sidewalks is the responsibility of the adjacent property owner. The Mayor's 2017 budget included a \$2.5 million line item to begin construction of missing sidewalks on city property but nothing to ease the burden when homeowners are faced with needed repairs. At my urging, Mayor Hancock has convened a Sidewalk Affordability Working Group with the charge to recommend to him, by June 30, a program that will lessen the burden on homeowners. It could involve some sort of cost-sharing, extended payment options, wholesale pricing, etc.Finally, I continue to enjoy meeting District residents at my Thursday morning office hours, 8a.m.noon, at Pete's University Park Café, 2345 E. Evans Ave. Stop in and join the conversation.

In Denver metro, inventory remains historically low. Active listings peaked at 7,942 in September 2016, and have de-

creased drastically to 4,127 active listings as of April 3, 2017. Lower inventory often drives list prices up, meaning it's best financially to sell your home when inventory is low.... Inventory shortages have driven up the prices on available homes, a factor which sometimes hinders sellers from listing out of fear they will have nowhere to move. Catch-22? contingent" position as they've already sold their home. Buyers seeking to find a home immediately in the ultra-competitive price range of \$500,000 or less should be prepared to move quickly with their offer. The demand for real estate by people looking to live in Denver metro has already proven to greatly exceed the current supply. Newly listed properties that are optimally priced given their location, floor plan and level of updating only spend a short time, with an average span of a minimal number of

days, on the market. These listings are also confronted with multiple offers, with many even over-bidding to win the property. Luxury listings of \$1 Million+ don't have quite the competition as the pool of qualified buyers is much smaller. However, some luxury homes also receive offers in a matter of days. ### **COP Shop opens in Broadway Marketplace**

Department (DPD) COP Shop recently opened at 487 S. Broadway in the Broadway Marketplace. It is the seventh COP Shop in the metro area. COP Shops are storefronts manned by volunteers trained by DPD. The volunteers provide assistance to citizens with crime prevention, traffic problems, neighborhood cleanup and zoning issues. One of their purposes is to offer a convenient place for people to file police reports for incidents that would typically require a trip to a police station, including non-injury auto accidents, thefts and reports of drug and gang activity. Each location is also stocked with paint from the city for residents who have had their property graffitied. Merce Lea, President of Broadway COP Shop; Officer Jim Lopez; Susan VaSalle,

"While we don't have hard statistics on COP Shops, we have witnessed positive results from creating partnerships with the neighborhoods," said DPD Lt. Mike O'Donnell. "We are always seeking new or proven methods to engage our community. This opportunity brings the neighbors, nearby business owners and officers together in a different capacity. They provide an open forum for dialogue regarding neighborhood concerns and how we can better serve those needs." While volunteers handle the day-to-day operations and assist the public with most requests, police are a regular presence at the COP Shops and have access to the facilities 24/7. Officers use the locations to write reports, meet with citizens or just take a break. They provide additional safety for the neighborhood, and are welcomed by residents and business owners. Officers

randomly show up and police cars are often parked out front of the COP Shops, which can be a deterrent to crime. The volunteers are part of the Police Department Volunteers in Police Service (VIPS). They have been trained by the DPD and many are graduates of the Denver Police Department Citizens' Police Academy. The COP Shop program started in 2002. The first location was at 7150 Leetsdale, near Ouebec. That location is still active. There are also COP Shops at Stapleton/Northfield, Federal, West Colfax, Bear Valley and West Denver. The Broadway COP Shop has been in operation for 13 years. Three years ago, the organization lost its last location. and was without a storefront until Broadway Marketplace management proactively approached District 3 officers about reopening.

"I'm proud to be a Denver Police Department volunteer and pleased to return as the president of the Broadway COP Shop in our new location," said Merce Lea "We look forward to working with residents, businesses, police officers and the city at our new location."

The Broadway COP shop is approximately 1500 square feet and features a reception area, conference room and several offices. The COP Shop has a two year lease, but pays no rent. Each COP Shop is a stand-alone non-profit and is responsible for raising its own funds for operation. Volunteers largely do this by forming relationships with local businesses, neighbors and neighborhood associations.

### 911 Adds Three New Tools in Denver

911NOW includes three key tools that will help residents get the assistance and information they need now: SMART911, SWIFT911, and TEXTto911. Together, these three tools will help Denver's first responders save time and save lives.

Smart911

Over 90% of calls made to 911 come from mobile phones. While mobile phones can be an important public safety tool, they can also create unique challenges for emergency responders. When you dial 911 from a mobile phone, the 911call taker has very little information to help you – only your phone number and a very general sense of your location. This does not bode well in an emergency when second count, particularly if you or your loved ones have medical conditions, or if there is a fire. Denver's solution is Smart911.

Smart911 is a private, secure service that allows you to create a safety profile that provides 911 and emergency responders with important information you want them to know about yourself, your family members and pets, your home and your vehicles in any kind of emergency. The information you provide automatically displays on the 911 call taker's screen.

When does Smart911 help?

- When the address or location is unknown
- The Smart911 profile links your mobile phone to your home, work and school addresses. This arms emergency responders with information about who is calling and possible locations where you or your loved ones may be found. Including visual details on your locations such as access points, floor layouts or gate codes can also help facilitate a faster response or rescue.
- When the caller cannot communicate
- There are times when you may not be able to communicate due to an allergic reaction, heart attack or home invasion. The Smart911 profile ensures your information is immediately available and that you are not the sole source of information. When there is a medical emergency
  - The Smart911 profile provides emergency responders with important information about members of your household, including medical conditions, physical disabilities, allergies, and medications that may cause dangerous drug interactions during treatment. When a member of your household goes missing
  - The Smart911 profile allows you to add key information about members of your household, including their names, ages, a physical description and recent photos.
  - When your vehicle is in an accident
    The Smart911 profile allows you to upload vehicle
    information for all members of your household. Having the description and license plate of your vehicle can
    quicken response in an accident, or if you need help
    while in your vehicle.
  - You decide how you want to be notified. Alerts can be received via telephone, mobile phone, email and text message. You can sign up via the Swift911 icon listed on Denver 911's webpage, text Swift911 to 99538, or download the Swift911 Public mobile app. How do I use Text to 911 and what information do I provide?
  - Enter the numbers 911 in the "To" field do not include dashes (example: 9-1-1).
  - Include the location of the emergency in the text

### **Help Mow Down Pollution This Summer**

as powered lawn mowers and lawn equipment contribute nearly 10% of the Denver metro area's ozone pre-cursor emissions. The Mow Down Pollution lawn mower exchange program helps area residents get rid of their old gasoline powered mowers, and switch to environmentally friendly electric mowers.

How it works

Participants register at mowdownpollution.org, for one of the three events happening in the Denver metro area. Two models of electric mowers are available, and pricing is determined from a combination of chosen model, sales tax, and trade in.

Participants with old gasoline mowers to trade in will receive additional discounts on their new electric mower. *Please note, all gasoline mowers to be* 

traded in must have the liquids drained prior to arrival at the event. No mowers will be accepted with oil or gas in them.

Each event takes place on a Saturday, typically from about 9 a.m. -3 p.m. Participants arrive at the location at a pre-determined time (chosen during registration) and never have to leave their vehicles.

#### Additional offerings

Participants also have the option of buying electric lawn equipment (trimmers/edger's/blowers) and recycling their old equipment on site. The new electric lawn and garden accessories will ship directly to the customer, and not be available for same day pickup.

and a brief summary of the situation.

- The Denver 911 call taker will reply to the text message with a series of questions. Answer the questions and follow the instructions.

- If you attempt to send a text to 911 in an area outside of Denver where the service is not yet available, an automatic "bounce-back" message will be sent to your phone.
- Only consumers who have purchased a text or data plan

through their wireless provider can send text messages to 911. Text message rates apply.

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
