

Protect Home From Package Theft

ackage theft isn't limited to the holidays—it's a year-round problem. To ensure packages are safely delivered to you and your loved ones, take the time to implement the home security tips discussed below. In addition, share them with your friends and family to ensure they, too, are protected against today's greedy package thieves.

- 1. Have packages delivered to where you are, not where you aren't. Your home is not the only place you can have your packages delivered. For example, if you work during the day, have items you order online delivered to your place of business instead of your home address.
- 2. Set up alternative delivery/pickup options through your local delivery services. Each delivery service offers alternative package delivery and pickup options to its local residents. This is true for both packages you mail to others and packages mailed to you.
- 3. Require a signature for packages you mail to family and friends. When mailing packages through your local post office or another delivery service, require the packages to be signed for when they are delivered. The small fee associated with this service is well worth the peace of mind you'll receive in knowing that your package will not fall prey to the hands of a thief.
- 4. Discourage thieves from targeting your resident with a few strategic home security devices. Many of the news reports on package theft are centered around home surveillance cameras that have caught these crimes on tape. As we have seen, many of these thieves have no problem stealing packages in broad daylight.
- 5. Keep an eye out for suspicious vehicles and people in your neighborhood. Putting a stop to package theft and residential burglaries is a team effort. Talk to your neighbors and encourage everyone to keep an eye out for unfamiliar vehicles and people in your neighborhood. If you notice a stranger walking or driving around your neighborhood, call the non-emergency number 720-913-2000 and provide a description of the vehicle and the person, including the license plate of the vehicle if possible. Recording the theft with the use of a cell phone or video camera can also be useful in bringing the criminal to justice.

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Message from City Councilman Paul Kashmann, District 6

ince neighborhood resident Sam Powell got my attention in late 2015, I have been working to improve Denver's pedestrian infrastructure, to increase safety and mobility options for all Denverites. As Chairman of City Council's Sidewalks Working Group I have been part of the discussion that has led to new policies and funding for sidewalk construction and repair, and have been pushing for creation of a standard package to increase pedestrian safety around elementary schools.

Well, I'm happy to say there is good news for Cory-Merrill





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families. I was pleased to tell a rowdy crowd of parents, kids and educators at Cory Elementary's recent Walk to School Day celebration that the city's 2018 budget includes about \$350,000 for a Safe Routes To School Plan for the Cory community. Traffic engineers will look at Steele St., Florida Ave. and Iowa Ave. to craft a plant for safer passage to the school for kids and families and begin construction of needed improvements. Sidewalks, crosswalks, bike lanes, signage and other tools may be part of the final package. While the formal design effort cannot begin until the budget is passed by Council in the coming weeks and a dedicated project manager can be assigned, our district traffic engineer is working right now to gather data on traffic counts, pedestrian crossing numbers, etc. I plan a significant involvement of neighborhood residents in the planning effort.

My sincere thanks to Mrs. Powell and the many other Cory-Merrill parents that have been raising their voices loudly and clearly to let city agencies know the importance of the work that will be getting under way soon. This has been the epitome of a community-driven effort, and I couldn't be more proud to represent you on City Council.

In a related effort, just to your north we're also working on traffic-calming measures along Bonnie Brae Blvd., between Mississippi Ave. and University Blvd. This wide, curving roadway leads to speeding traffic and difficult crossings to the north and south reaches of the Bonnie Brae neighborhood. Denver Public Works has done initial drawings of potential changes, and we'll be working with the neighborhood association and community residents to determine a path forward.

The Nov. 7 GO Bond questions (seven separate ordinances proposing investments in Safety, Transportation/Mobility, Arts & Culture, City Facilities, Denver Health, Libraries and Parks & Recreation) will ask voters to approve the issuance of bonds that will finance hundreds of construction and maintenance projects across the city. Cory Merrill Real Estate Update

Hello Cory-Merrill! A managing broker at our firm, Steve Blank, is a guru on market analysis and I thought I'd share a recent article of his that speaks to "the bubble question." Here's Steve's article (in part) –

Denver has been a primary city leading the nation past the recession years (2008-2011). Since 2012, Denver expe-



rienced annual price appreciation between 9.5% and 11% and could likely end up near 10% in 2017.

Let's look at why some cities "bubbled and then burst" nearly ten years

ago. Many prospective homebuyers and sellers ask their Realtor if Denver is possibly entering a "bubble" phase. It's not unreasonable to wonder (when things are good) if the market might be headed south.

The answer is that it's highly improbable for Denver! The "bubble to burst" cities like Las Vegas, Phoenix and Miami, were experiencing annual price appreciation of anywhere from 20% – 35% for several years before 2008. New home and condo construction development were built at rapid rates as those areas became quickly "overbuilt". Denver is building at about half the pace of 2005 when 20,000 new homes were built compared to 11,000 in 2016, which is not meeting current demand. Apartment construction has begun to meet demand, but will likely level off soon. In many metro areas, price appreciation will continue as the principle of supply and demand.

Another major reason our country experienced the recession was due to graft and greed of our nation's financial institutions that provided mortgage loans to any borrower who could sign their name to a 95% – 100% mortgage. That system no longer exists and loans

are now being originated to actual credit-worthy buyers. Rising prices and low housing supply are a challenge to home affordability. Conversely, driving forces such as low interest rates, low unemployment (4.1% nationally and 2-3% in CO), with strong job creation and salary growth, will continue to provide market balance.

Now that fall is here, we see more homes coming on the market, providing better selection and less seasonal buyer competition. First time buyers and potential move-up buyers can experience wealth-building benefits of homeownership before it becomes more difficult. Spot a coyote on your evening stroll?

Denverites out and about in the evenings shouldn't be surprised if they spot a coyote or two enjoying the golden hour, too.


Coyote sightings are frequent around town, particularly at dawn and dusk, said Vicki Vargas-Madrid, a wildlife ecologist with Denver Parks and Recreation. But joggers and pet owners should show no fear: coyotes can be kept at bay with some good old screaming and shouting. Turns out, they're just as afraid of us as we are of them.

"If they do encounter a coyote walking on a trail, raise hands and yell, and make noises to make them want to leave," Vargas-Madrid said. "Instill natural fear in them."

Reports of missing cats blamed on the urban carnivores have started popping up on neighborhood social media sites. And the city gets calls about people seeing coyotes frequently, typically every other day, Vargas-Madrid said.

The best way to remain safe in the presence of a coyote is to scare it off, by yelling and throwing things. Coyotes don't tend to be a threat to human safety, but they can target animals. To protect pets, it's best to keep animals on leashes while out walking and indoors at night.

Coyotes are most active during mating season, in the spring. By summer and fall, the animals tend to be raising their young, and so are more likely to be traveling in packs.



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












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
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
